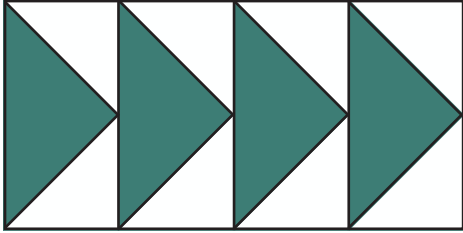


# BLOCK 4




## FLYING GEESE

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Block 4: Make three.  
Unfinished size: 6 1/2" x 12 1/2"

### Fabrics:

	9900-200	3/8 yard	Fabric A
	9900-270	1/3 yard	Fabric B
	Quilt in a Day Small Flying Geese Ruler #2006QD		

### Cutting:

#### Block 4

White	A	3 - 9" squares
Lagoon	B	3 - 7 1/2" squares

Use 1/4" seams and press as directed.

### Block Assembly:

With right sides facing, layer a Fabric B square in the center of a Fabric A square.

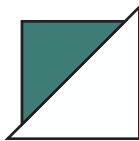
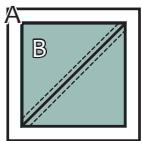
Draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of the Fabric B square.

Stitch 1/4" from each side of the drawn line.

Cut apart on the marked line.

Make six Partial Geese Units.

Press toward the Fabric B.



Make six.

With right sides facing, layer two Partial Geese Units.

Make sure they are turned so that the seams are in the same direction. Match outside edges.

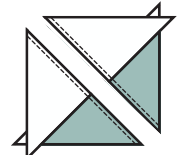
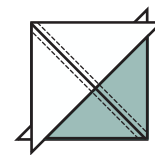
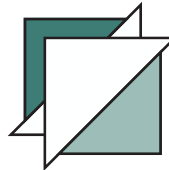
Draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of the top Partial Geese Unit in the opposite direction of the sewn seams.

Stitch 1/4" from each side of the drawn line.

Cut apart on the marked line.

Make six Geese Units.

Snip the seam allowance at the midway point and press away from the dark.



Make six.

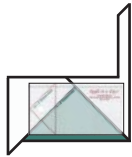
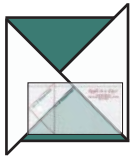
## FLYING GEESE

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Using the Small Flying Geese Ruler, line up the 3" x 6" Finished Geese ruler lines with the Geese Unit. Line up the peak of the triangle with the dotted line on the ruler for the 1/4" seam allowance.

Trim fabric and repeat on the other end of the Geese Unit.

Flying Geese Unit should measure 3 1/2" x 6 1/2".

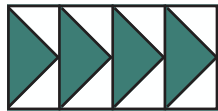
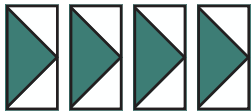


Make twelve.

Assemble Block 4.

Press open.

Block 4 should measure 6 1/2" x 12 1/2".



Make three.
